

L.K: Reading, interpreting and comparing bar charts

Bar charts are different from pictograms as they do not contain pictures to represent data. But, they need to be even more precise! You need to be very careful to use a ruler and either a sharp pencil or a pen to create your bar chart.

Bar charts have axis. Axis are the words we use to describe the horizontal and vertical lines on a bar chart. The X axis the vertical line (line going straight up) and the y axis is the line going horizontal (left to right). The bar charts will show the adults and childrens favourite New York attractions. You need to read the bar charts, label the x and y axis and then answer the questions at the bottom of the page. Make sure to fully explain your answers!




Label the graph axes with the headings:

- Number of people
- Favourite New York attraction

Then, using the frequency table, label the bars with the name of the attraction.

Statue of Liberty	30
Brooklyn Bridge	23
Empire State Building	43
Chrysler Building	29
Times Square	7
Central Park	18
Total	150

- 8. Tim and Julie have decided they want their tour to visit two attractions that are not too far away from each other. They can either take a tour to see the Statue of Liberty and Brooklyn Bridge, or the Empire State Building and Central Park. Which tour would be more popular for children? How do you know?
